

Meetings

Tuesday, March 18, 7:00 PM: Catherine Young. Analysis of Potential Hazards to the Future Conservation of the Endemic Alpine Species Packera franciscana



Catherine Young, a junior at the NAU School of Forestry, will present the important conservation breakthroughs that she has made for the threatened alpine sunflower, *Packera franciscana*. The species is only found near Flagstaff, above the treeline of the San Francisco Peaks. She successfully established the first captive population of these plants outside of a greenhouse setting. Her observations in the field suggest that a new hybrid zone has formed within the last 10 years. She has also created the first tissue culture protocol to produce genetically identical plants to those in the wild. The most recent developments are laying the foundation for her future project that will attempt to predict the response of the species to potential hazards such as climate change, competition with hybrids, and wildfire. **Hybrid meeting: in-person and via Zoom.**

Tuesday, April 15, 7:00 PM: Amelia Blake. Propagating Native Plants



Growing uncultivated plant varieties can be challenging. They often have seed dormancy, unique soil needs, and don't grow well in containers. Because of this, many native plants are not available in the nursery trade and native plant enthusiasts are left to cultivate their own. Amelia will discuss strategies for successful native-plant propagation.

Amelia is co-owner of Lily of the Filed Nursery, which focuses on growing native and heirloom plants that are especially well-adapted to the Flagstaff area. Amelia spent her childhood working with plants at the NAU Research Greenhouse during her father's tenure

as greenhouse manager. She received her B.S. in Plant Sciences from the University of Arizona. She then worked at Native Plant and Seed for three years before opening Lily of the Field Nursery in 2020 with her husband. She sells at most local markets, runs the Gardeners' Market in east Flagstaff each spring, and sells by appointment from her home in the Upper Greenlaw neighborhood. **Hybrid meeting: in-person and via Zoom.**

Tuesday, May 20, 7:00 PM: Dr. James Smith. Recent Molecular Phylogenetic Analyses of Alpine Spring Parsley, Pseudocymopterus montanus

Alpine spring parsley (*Pseudocymopterus montanus*) is known to be highly variable morphologically and in its phenology. Dr. James Smith will present preliminary results that separate what we commonly call *Pseudocymopterus montanus* into several separate well-supported clades.

Dr. Smith is the Director of the Snake River Plains Herbarium at Boise State University. His research interests include the phylogenetics of western North American Apiaceae and using Sanger sequencing techniques to discover cryptic or near cryptic species within many widespread species.

This will be a virtual event with Dr. Smith presenting from Idaho. The presentation will not be recorded.



She presented *Pre-Contact Agaves in the SW United States: Rediscovering Lost Crops Among the Hohokam & Other AZ Cultures.* A small group of scientists and plant enthusiasts spent two days surveying the status and health of agaves that Wendy had recorded in 1988. Agaves were an important food and fiber source for the ancient cultures in Arizona, and we were successful in locating some of the clones during our agave adventures.

AZNPS Conservation Efforts

Waterman Restoration Site

2025 marks the 15th year of ongoing restoration of buffelgrass infested site to a Saguaro-Palo Verde upland Sonoran landscape.

In September 2022, a freak microburst with 3.5 inches rainfall carved a 500ft erosion ditch down the upper length of the site. Starting in January 2023, AZNPS volunteers have been plugging the gash with recycled Christmas trees. A report of our 2025 Christmas tree effort was published in the Arizona Daily Star in January: Desert restoration project has 99 problems but a ditch ain't one.

Riparian Restoration in Catalina State Park

Since 2016, AZNPS volunteers have been steadily removing invasive plants (11 different species) from five riparian canyons in Catalina State Park. Invasive removal has resulted in an impressive resurgence of native plants. The keystone restoration species is deergrass (*Muhlenbergia rigens*). Following the very wet 2023-4 winter, we are witnessing an impressive recruitment of deergrass in this dry 2024-25 season. This dry cold winter has been an opportunity to differentiate the relative cold tolerance between species. To our great surprise, Deergrass is very cold tolerant despite its classification as a "warm season perennial bunchgrass"!

We continue to manually remove fountaingrass (*Cenchrus setaere*) and African lovegrasses (*Eragrostis curvula*) in remaining persistent stands with the help of CSP volunteers. Here is an example of one day's work:
