New Interim Chapter

The Society has approved an interim chapter in Tonto Basin, with meetings scheduled to begin in October. If you're interested in participating, please contact Becky Settje at her <u>email</u> or at her <u>Instagram account</u>.

Meetings will include botany walks, roadside botany, field identification, nonnative invasive plant education, guest speakers, conservation efforts, and outreach.

Meetings will be held regularly in Tonto Basin on a six-acre garden that exhibits mostly native plant species. Meetings are open to anyone interested in native plants and will focus geographically from Globe to Pine and all areas in between.

Becky Settje is passionate about native plants species. She was a volunteer nature guide for eight years at Garden in The Woods, the headquarters for the Native Plant Trust (formerly New England Wildflower Society) and worked with the Rhode Island Native Plant Society developing children's nature walks, focusing on native plant species. She currently assists, as needed, with nonnative plant removal and species regeneration at Tonto National Monument.

Website Update

Our AZNPS website regularly gets 500 clicks a week. The Plant List is consistently our most visited page and an important part of outreach. We have added more plants and the page now has more search functions. Are you new to Arizona and looking for a shrub with low water needs that attracts butterflies? The Plant List search will show you 13 plants that meet these criteria. Looking for a cactus that is pollinated by bats? Two plants fit this.

New on our Home Page is a calendar with the nearest four events from our events page. As before, the Home Page also includes a Blog, Announcements, and links to Plant Press Arizona, Happenings and our ever-popular page about the Arizona State Tree.

The Conservation tab on our menu has added pages to describe some important Conservation and Restoration Ongoing Projects. This includes information and photos about the "A" Mountain buffelgrass and native plant recovery in Tucson.

Arizona has an extremely rich flora due to its diversity of altitudes and climate. Our Floras page includes links to many resources including flora by region.

Last but not least, our website features the Sue Rutman Plant Identification Guides. This collection of over 450 detailed photographic guides to Arizona was created by botanist Sue Rutman, who uses a scanning technique to capture plant images and details of live specimens in 3-D and in color. You can use these remarkable composite images to help you examine details of a species, to assist in plant ID, or simply to appreciate the immense beauty of plants, especially when seen close-up.

Our special needs menu includes Vegetarian and No Red Meat options only but we try to work with guests and their allergens. LODGING OPTIONS:

Fees include 2 evening seminar/workshops, 2 half-day field trips, Station use fee, Room & Board (6 meals)

- 1. Dorm room (shared) including meals \$82/per person/per night
- 2. Private dorm room (if available) with meals \$92/per person per night
- 3. Casita shared room w/private bath for 2-3 people including meals \$95/per person/per night
- 4. Casita private room for one person (if available) w/private bath including meals \$135 per night
- 5. Children 4-15 with meals \$40 per child per night. Children under 4 are free.
- 6. Camping on site or staying off site including meals \$47/per person/per night
- 7. Staying off-site, without meals \$25.00 one-time station fee
- 8. Workshop Fee \$30/per person for the weekend



Field Trips

Saturday & Sunday, September, 8:00 - 10:00 AM. A Morning Stroll in a Happily Recovering Desert at the Waterman Restoration Site

The Waterman Restoration site on Ironwood Forest National Monument is now in full desert recovery with over 110 native plant species and a gradually increasing number of insects, birds, small mammals, reptiles and even visits of desert sheep. In the mid-2000s this same site was known as the "Mother of all Buffelgrass Patches." After generous recent rains, the desert is now coming alive. Perennial plants are leafing out and new plants are emerging underfoot. We will stroll through a desert in various stages of restoration, walking among mid-size and newly emerging desert trees, ocotillos, and bushes; learning how to identify them in different phases. We will learn about many overlooked plants that are powerful restoration agents and soil builders. We will see plant succession in action among trees and shrubs. We will also see how simple water harvesting techniques have brought life-giving moisture to the landscape and healed areas that had been bare and apparently "sterile." Best of all, we will discover new things from participants who happen to see something unexpected or who have knowledge or observations to share with the group. This will be an opportunity to enjoy the desert together and learn from one another!
