

#### Tuesday, June 21, 7:00 PM: Kara Barron. Farming Wild Seed

Increases in wildfires, climate change, and continued land degradation are increasing the need for ecological restoration in the desert southwest. Strictly wild collecting seeds for this purpose is not practical and has the potential to cause further harm to the land we are trying to protect. One way to fill this need is to begin farming for conservation. Desert Seed Resource Center was formed to address this need.

Kara Barron has a Masters of Science in Plant Biology and Conservation from Arizona State University and is currently the Program Director for Restoration and Native Plant Materials at Gila Watershed Partnership in Safford, AZ. She is also one of the founders, and Deputy Director of, the Desert Seed Resource Center which has a mission to increase the availability of native plant materials for conservation of the Desert Southwest through education, research, and collaboration.

## Tuesday, July 19, 7:00 PM: Susie Smith. Pollen, Archaeobotany, and Ethnobotany: Glimpses of Traditional Ecological Knowledge

Join Susie Smith for some cool microphotography images of pollen and insights into the life ways of the prehistoric cultures who lived in our region. The ethnographic accounts of Native Americans lives are a treasure for understanding the web of relationships between people and the landscapes that supported them. And this archive provides a lens into understanding the archaeobotanical materials recovered at archaeological sites.

## Tuesday, August 16, 7:00 PM: Kat Alicia Thompson. Food Sovereignty of the Laguna and Navajo Nations



This presentation will provide examples of ancestral and current Indigenous farming practices that have sustained communities and cultures in the Southwest for thousands of years. These agricultural practices can revitalize a local landscape into an edible landscape that is reflective of our bioregion and our diets. This includes exploring traditional uses of native plants and trees, and how to utilize them in a local food system.

Kat Alicia Thompson grew up in Flagstaff, Arizona. She received her graduate degree from Northern Arizona University in Forestry and Applied Indigenous Studies. Her studies focused on how tribes can secure food sovereignty through environmental land management practices. Currently, Kat is located in New Mexico and coordinating with Indigenous farmers in creating edible landscapes.

#### **Spring Recap**

We have had several recent field trips in the Tucson area, and although the flowering this year was rather limited, it was surprising how much diversity we found along the trails. In early March, incoming chapter president Jack Dash led an enthusiastic group along the trail bordering **Peña Blanca Lake**.





Also in March, Paul and Susie Fish, archaeologists from the Arizona State Museum, led a group of us to an agave cultivation site at the base of **Tumamoc Hill**, where we could see the remnants of terracing and rock piles and could imagine Hohokam cultivators 1,000 years ago growing *Agave murphyii* for its food and fiber. Other Tucson-area trips were led by Lyn Loveless and Sue Rutman.







John Scheuring and his colleagues convened several trips throughout April at **Catalina State Park**, where they examined the outcomes of the Big Horn fire on the landscape and the impacts of selective invasive species control on native plants. In sum, Tucson members have had a pleasant spring season appreciating the native plants of the area. We look forward to greater diversity with the arrival of the monsoon season.
